Orienteering Tasmania Development Report 2024 – Orienteering Year 2023

Orienteering Tasmania’s Development program exposes non-orientees to orienteering through the sporting schools’ program, the outreach program, public promotion events and publicity and marketing. Twilight events remain a great way to get newcomers into the sport. EVOC and Australopers each ran 12 twilight events through autumn and spring, and Pathfinders ran 4 events using the map run format.

Sporting Schools and Outreach

The Sporting Schools and Outreach programs expose large numbers of students to orienteering through orienteering events run specifically for each school. In 2023 we ran orienteering courses at 19 schools (often included mapping) and exclusively made/updated maps at another 7 schools.

Sporting Schools is funded by the federal government and allows primary schools to contract sporting organisations to conduct activities within their school. Orienteering is one of the 32 sports participating in Sporting Schools.

Sporting Schools and Outreach were again run exceptionally well by Mike and Jane Calder in the south and Jo Bissett in the north-west. Last year additional mapping was done by Mike Dowling, Paul Pacque, Jiří Vales and Rod Bissett, and coaching provided by Jo Bissett, Francesca Taufer, Will Whittington, Veronika Kubinova, Jane Calder and Mike Calder.

National Orienteering League and Rankings

The Tasmanian Foresters had a strong contingent of JNOL and NOL runners representing the state at the National Orienteering League events, boosted by the first round being held at Oceania in Tasmania, with the following three rounds in Sydney, ACT (Easter carnival) and Castlemaine, Victoria. Brodie Nankervis providing ongoing support as the 2023 NOL Team Manager.

- Eight Senior Men scored NOL points for the Senior Men, with the combined performance resulting in the Tas. Foresters finishing in 2nd place overall. Congratulations to Brodie Nankervis on finishing 2nd and Joe Dickinson in 8th.
- Mikayla Cooper (9th) and Francesca Taufer (13th) lead the 12x Tas. Foresters scoring in the Senior Women's category.
- Eight Tas. Foresters competed in the Junior Men's league, with Niko Stoner (10th) and Jett McComb (11th) being the largest point scorers; placing the Tas. Foresters in 4th position overall.
- Four Junior women competed, with Liana Stubbs (9th) finishing within the top 10 point scorers. The strong performances of Tara Powell, Zali McComb and Sophie Best saw the Junior Women finishing in 4th position overall.

The SILVA Medal is awarded to the Australian orienteer who achieves the highest level of consistent performance in their class in designated national events each year. In 2023 the SILVA Medal was awarded to Euan Best who dominated his class in 2023 with a significant winning margin.

International Representation

Four Tasmanians were selected to represent Australia internationally, competing in events throughout Europe.

- Will Whittington represented Australia at the Junior World Mountain Bike Orienteering Championships
- Brodie Nankervis – was selected in the Australian team to compete at World Cup #2
- Liana Stubbs and Niko Stoner represented Australia at the Australian/NZ Challenge in NZ in June 2023.

Coaching and Training

Our Coach in Residence, Francesca Taufer from Italy, arrived in November 2022 and extended her stay through to October 2023. Francesca generously shared her extensive knowledge and experience, organizing coaching sessions throughout the year. Technical Report

Calendar

Another successful year of events were conducted across all three regions of the state. As is the norm, last minute changes to some event locations were needed and one OST event was cancelled due to the lack of a suitable area and an organizer. A number of double weekends were introduced to reduce travel, along with a mix in formats to reflect the current trends in national and international orienteering.

Statistician

SPORTident

Eventor

Ian Rathbone continues to be the “backroom boy” of Eventor. Ian ensures that our events are listed and open for entries as well as trouble shooting the various issues we encounter in its everyday use. He also mentors others in its use.

Mapping

A range of mapping was undertaken during 2023.

Much was done through the sporting schools programme, the * areas are OT maps.

In the north mapping was limited to small updates of various maps around Launceston;

- Scottsdale High School and surrounding community park
- *partial update of Stephensdale
- *Sprint map updates: Brooks HS, Alanvale TAFE, St Patrick’s College, Windsor Park

These were completed by Paul Pacque and Jiri Vales (Stephensdale).
